



The Parable of Two Eagles and a Vine (Ezk 17)

RECAP: [Ezekiel](#)

CONTEXT: Last time Ezekiel was being called to be God’s prophet, to warn His people of judgement. In chs. 4–5 Ezekiel performs some acts to depict this. In chs. 8–11 he sees a vision of what is transpiring back in the Temple, which is not good and why God is going to reject Israel and His glory depart from the Temple. In ch. 11 there is a small glimmer of hope we’ll consider this LD. Chs. 12–24 are all about the coming Judgement on Judah, including our parable today in Ch. 17.
